

Not Our Parents' Economy

The world of work is changing – fast – and there is a growing disconnect between classroom instruction and career success.

Shrinking Talent Pools & Growing Skills Gaps

- 40% of today's job skills are projected to be outdated in just five years.
- 33% of teens are concerned they lack the skills to reach their career goals.
- 36% of teens are concerned they can afford the necessary education and training to reach their goals.²

Economic Mobility Becoming Harder to Reach

- 50% of today's youth are expected to earn less than their parents for the first time in modern history.¹
- 36% of teens worry they won't earn enough in their chosen field.
- 87% expect to earn extra income through side hustles or gig work.²

When College & Career Don't Connect

- 52% of graduates are underemployed a year after graduation.³
- 45% of graduates are still underemployed a decade after graduation.³
- Underemployed graduates typically earn only about 25% more than those with no education beyond high school.³

Education Creates Economic Opportunity & Mobility

JA works in partnership with schools across Wisconsin inspiring and preparing our young people to face change head-on, leading us toward a brighter future.

- 90% JA Alumni say JA played an important role in helping them believe they can follow their career path and achieve their personal and professional development.
- 83% of JA Alumni report having an “extremely fulfilling” career.
- 66% of JA Alumni describe themselves as “thriving.”⁴

JA provides experiences that simulate the application of real-world concepts in post-secondary environments. It's all part of bringing the real world to students, opening their minds to their potential and helping them be the change they want to see in themselves, their careers and their communities.

Impacts & Outcomes

Through innovative learning programs, strategic partnerships, and a commitment to access and impact, JA is building a future-ready generation and strengthening communities across the state.

Junior Achievement – Opening Doors to New Possibilities

Each year, more than 100,000 students around the state benefit from a JA learning experience. That's a big number. But real change starts at a much more personal level. It happens one-to-one between a student and a JA volunteer or mentor planting a seed of knowledge and watching it grow from abstract concept to real life lesson.

What can be harder to see is the long-term impact of those personal learning experiences as students move into adulthood. That's why it's so rewarding when we hear from adults who were "JA kids" as they reflect on the lifelong impact those early experiences had on the person they are today.

Heather Swart is a JA alum. It has been more than two decades since she participated in our JA Titan® Business Challenge. The annual competition teaches students how to navigate the decisions needed to develop a successful company and to practice life skills including critical thinking, strategic development, and teamwork.

Heather took first prize in her competition and was awarded a JA scholarship to help launch her into college. The scholarship proved to be the impetus and financial support she needed to enroll at UW-Sheboygan. From there, she went on to earn her B.A. in accounting from the University of the Virgin Islands and ultimately, her master's degree.

As often happens, Heather's journey has taken many twists and turns. Today she gives back to her community through her work at Meals on Wheels. Looking back, she credits JA with making the journey possible. In her words – there is not one straight path to success, but every opportunity opens doors to new possibilities.

Waunakee Teens Score a ‘Three-peat’ Win for Wisconsin in National Championship

Charlie Zimbric and Nathan Hansen from Waunakee Community High School became national champions in the JA Titan® Business Challenge in Atlanta. The Waunakee duo is the third Wisconsin team to win the national event since 2022. The national competition is part of “Future Bound,” a 3-day event featuring immersive learning experiences that connect students with mentors, industry professionals, and real-world opportunities.



Brookfield Teen Wins \$5,000 Scholarship as JA’s Statewide Young Entrepreneur

Aidan Liu of Brookfield Central High School took the top spot in JA’s statewide Young Entrepreneur competition in April. Liu beat out four other statewide finalists in the Shark Tank-style competition where he pitched his “Let’s Skate Foundation” to a panel of judges who awarded him the \$5,000 scholarship. Since Liu started his non-profit, Let’s Skate, in 2020, the group has promoted speedskating in local communities by helping lower barriers for entry. [Watch his video.](#)

3DE by Junior Achievement of Wisconsin was awarded the Innovation in Education award as part of the 2025 BizTimes Nonprofit Excellence Awards, which recognize outstanding nonprofits and corporate citizens for their efforts to make Milwaukee a better place to live, work, and play. 3DE (3-dimensional education) is a curriculum model that transforms high school learning through relevant, real-world business case challenge methodology.



Local Staffer Receives National Award

Wausau’s Christina Kuenstler, Operations Coordinator for JA’s Northcentral Area, was selected from nominees across the U.S. as the winner of the JA USA MVP award at a national leadership conference held this last month in Cleveland, OH. Christina’s coworkers described her as “the heart of Junior Achievement,” and someone who is “truly the glue that holds the team together.”



Wisconsin Business Hall of Fame Honors Legendary Leaders

Junior Achievement of Wisconsin hosted the 2025 Wisconsin Business Hall of Fame on May 29 to celebrate four extraordinary leaders: Mark Murphy (Green Bay Packers), Jeff Yabuki (Fiserv), Judy & Thomas Pyle (Rayovac), and John Schlifske (Northwestern Mutual). Funds raised support JA’s work to inspire and prepare young people for success through financial literacy, career readiness, and entrepreneurship.

Classroom Content & Curriculum Offer Enhanced Learning Opportunities

JA works in partnership with schools across Wisconsin to offer K-12 in-class curriculum. Volunteers from Wisconsin’s business community deliver interactive lessons that build foundational financial literacy and career readiness skills.

Experiential Learning Centers (Appleton and Milwaukee) Connect Classroom to Careers

BizTown is a simulated city where 4th-6th graders run businesses, manage finances, and experience the responsibilities of adulthood. In JA Finance Park, 7th-12th graders experience first-hand financial decision making and career options.

Workforce Pathway Access Creates Opportunity

When students gain access to mentors, networks, and meaningful experiences, they open doors to new possibilities. Through job shadows, [career days](#) and career speakers, students gain direct exposure to career pathways, build networks, and develop essential employability skills.

[3DE Integrated Instructional Model \(Milwaukee\) Reinvents Classroom Learning \[Video\]](#)

3DE transforms high school education by bringing real-world business case studies into the classroom, integrating core subjects with problem-solving projects and fostering life skills such as self-directed learning, collaboration and teamwork, critical thinking, and cultural agility.

In the JA Titan Business Challenge, high school students compete as business CEOs in the phone industry, experiencing first-hand how an organization makes decisions, analyzes outcomes, evaluates alternatives, and strategizes against competitors. Winning teams earn scholarship money and teams placing first and second advance to the Wisconsin state-level competition where state winners move on to nationals.

JA Stock Market Challenge®

The JA Stock Market Challenge® is a live stock market simulation where student teams play the role of stock traders and spend 60 (fictional) days competing to see who comes out on top. 1st and 2nd place teams receive prizes. Prior to the event, students learn the ups and downs of trading through five, 45-minute sessions of JA’s Take Stock in Your Future curriculum. Sponsors and volunteers help bring our events to life.

18+ Post Secondary Education

Perhaps our most exciting growth is happening in the post-secondary education space. JA is responding to emerging needs among a growing number of young adults struggling financially with independent living after school. JA is excited to be part of this new opportunity to help support one student at a time for their “last mile” of academic learning, enabling youth to be successful in their next steps in life.

JA Young Entrepreneur Competition

In this “Shark Tank” style competition, four finalists from grades 9-12 are selected to pitch their businesses to a panel of celebrity judges for a chance to win a \$5,000 top prize. The annual competition spotlights Wisconsin youth who have successfully turned a business idea into a fully operational commercial enterprise.


